

For three decades, a partnership between Lincoln Housing Authority and Lincoln Public Schools has provided low-income families with a brand new home. This year, the program will celebrate the completion of its 30th home at 5010 Starr St.

Built by Lincoln Northeast High School (LNE) residential construction students, this year's home features three bedrooms, two baths and an unattached two-car garage. It also includes an unfinished basement with egress window and plumbing for a future bedroom and bathroom.

LNE students gain hands-on experience throughout the school year, completing the framing, drywall, trim, painting, cabinetry and other projects under the supervision of teacher Bob Freese. Licensed contractors perform the electrical and plumbing work.

Students see the value in helping others, but also learn skills for the future.

"While this may not apply to the future occupation I choose to go into, it allows me to learn every day things I can use," said Derek Williams, senior.

"This is a good learning experience, and someday I'll know how to repair my own home because I helped build this house," said Brian Trumblee, senior.

Sam Roberts, senior, chose to take the class for the second year for the other benefits it provides.

"This teaches you how to work in the extreme heat and extreme cold," he said. "This class is great for anyone looking to get their first job, because you have to work in a team atmosphere and learn how to do the work and communicate."

Once the house is completed, it will be sold to an eligible family involved with LHA. The price hasn't been set, but interested LHA families can determine their eligibility to purchase the house or take advantage of a lease-to-purchase contract by contacting Susan Tatum at SusanT@L-housing.com. Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) is a voluntary no-cost program for LHA tenants, and with support from FSS caseworkers, individuals work to take steps toward their goals such as creating an emergency fund, paying off debt, preparing for homeownership, earning a degree and job training.

The program lasts up to five years, and individuals won't lose housing assistance by participating. Typically, when you or someone in your household earns more money, rent goes up. That can make it difficult; but with FSS, your rent increase is deposited into an escrow savings account instead. Over time, the savings amount increases while you receive one-on-one support and coaching. Once you graduate, you can use your savings however you want.

The mobile phone app, MyLink (formerly MyLNK), allows users to find community resources and services anonymously

from organizations and programs in Lincoln. The app is free, easy to use and updated regularly with accurate information. Resources are provided for children and families, victims of domestic violence, disability services, senior services, military and veteran resources,



employment, education, food, housing, transportation,

COVID-19, tax preparation, health, legal, LGBTQ+ resources and more.

The app can be downloaded for Android and Apple phones. Once downloaded, it doesn't require an internet connection or data plan to look up information within the app. The information is also available at mylnk. app.

Information is provided in Arabic, English, Somali, Spanish and Vietnamese, and has recently added Dari, Kurdish Kurmanji, Kurdish Sorani, Pashto and Ukrainian.

JOB AND BID OPPORTUNITIES

Under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Lincoln Housing Authority is required to publicly post employment and bid opportunities.

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USPS now requires identity verification for change of address

Protecting yourself from identity theft is important, and that also means protecting your mail. Sometimes when an individual moves, it can take a few days for mail to catch up.

The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) has enhanced security protocols surrounding its change of address service by implementing additional take verification methods to further address global identification theft concerns. USPS has also seen a surge in mail thefts and letter carrier robberies.

The basics of filling out a change of address with USPS haven't changed, but USPS has added an additional step to verify a person's identity. How you verify your identity will depend on how you file your change of address online at USPS. com, or in person at your local post office

location. A change of address is only activated after the ID has been verified.

When filing online, you can opt-in to receive a verification code or link on your mobile phone. You will be required to pay a \$1.10 identity verification fee and the billing address on the credit card must match either your old or new address. If the online identity verification succeeds, the USPS will email you a confirmation code. Keep this code; you can use it to modify or cancel your request. If your online identity verification was not successful, you will need to complete a change of address in person at a post office location. You will receive an email with instructions and a barcode to verify your identity in person.

If submitting a change of address

form at a post office, bring two forms current and unexpired photo ID:

- State-issued driver's license or nondriver's license identification card
- U.S. Passport
- Uniformed Services Identification Card

If you use a passport or Uniformed Services Identification Card, you'll need to present a second form of ID that includes your name and an address. This may include a lease, Identification or deed of trust; voter or vehicle registration card; or home or vehicle insurance policy or card.

Remember that the name and address on any identification must match the old or new address on your change of address request.

Free tax preparation services offered

As the countdown to the April 15, 2024, tax deadline approaches, consider using free community tax preparation services through the Lincoln EITC Coalition's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program.

VITA offers no-cost federal- and state-tax preparation and filing for low- to moderate-income households. VITA sites operate in various Lincoln area locations from January to April.

Note: The scope of work that can be done within the VITA site is defined by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). If your return is considered "out of scope" for this site, VITA volunteers will not be able to prepare your return.

Please bring the following to tax preparation sites:

- Photo ID for all tax return signers. Both spouses must sign if filing jointly.
- Social Security cards or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number letters for everyone on the return.
- W-2s from employer, W-2Gs for gambling income, and 1099 forms for miscellaneous income including interest, dividends, unemployment, pension, 401(k) distribution and other income.
- Child care receipts, including provider's tax ID and address.
- Statements of any student loan interest, mortgage interest and property tax.
- 1095s showing credible health insurance coverage.
- Records of revenue and expenses for selfemployment or home-based business.
- Checking or savings account information for direct deposit/debit.
- If you plan to visit a VITA site, please bring a copy of last year's tax return.

Apply for resident scholarship

Lincoln Housing Authority tenants can apply for the 2024 HAI Group's Resident Scholarship Program. The deadline is May 31.

There will be 20 scholarships, valued at \$6,000 each, awarded nationally in a drawing this spring. LHA residents have been awarded this scholarship in the past.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens or a permanent resident in the country with a green card; and have lived in a public housing authority or property with a Housing Choice Voucher for six months. The applicant also must be attending an accredited or licensed technical school, two- or four-year college or university; or earning a master's degree or PhD program for the fall 2024 semester.
